

4. The Mid-Autumn Festival

The mid-autumn festival (traditional Chinese: 中秋節; simplified Chinese: 中秋; Vietnamese: tết Trung Thu) is a harvest festival celebrated by ethnic Chinese and some other South-East Asian people. This holiday is celebrated in mainland China, Taiwan, Singapore, Malaysia, Vietnam and by ethnic Chinese worldwide. Mid-Autumn Festival is a term sometimes also used to describe Chuseok in Korea and Tsukimi in Japan.

The festival is held on the 15th day of the 8th month of the lunar calendar with full moon at night, corresponding to late September or early October of the Gregorian calendar. This year, it was celebrated on September 15, 2016. China listed the festival as an "intangible cultural heritage" in 2006 and a public holiday in 2008. It is also public holiday in Taiwan and Hong Kong. In the Vietnamese culture, it is considered the second-most important holiday. The festival was a time to enjoy the successful reaping of rice and wheat with food offerings made in honour of the moon. Today, it is still an occasion for outdoor reunions among friends and relatives to eat moon-cakes and watch the moon, a symbol of harmony and unity.

Making and sharing moon-cakes is one of the hallmark traditions of this festival. In Chinese culture, a round shape symbolizes completeness and reunion. Thus, the sharing and eating of round moon-cakes among family members during the week of the festival signify the completeness and unity of families.

There are different flavours of moon-cakes, of which the top ten are: Five Kernel and Roast Pork, Red Bean Paste, Lotus Seed Paste, Snow Skin, Vegetable and Fruit, Chocolate, Green Tea, Ice Cream, Cream Cheese, and Seafood. I would recommend international students to try these moon-cakes with friends, and feel the Chinese experiences of completeness and unity.
