PROGRAM PROPOSAL FOR BEIJING NORMAL UNIVERSITY

Three-Week American Philosophy and American Culture Program

Abstract

The Philosophy department at Tufts University will offer to the students of Beijing Normal University a program entitled "American Philosophy and American Culture." This three-week program will allow students to explore major themes in American religious, political, and philosophical culture.

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PROPOSAL

The Tufts University's International Programs and Partnerships department is extremely pleased to offer the following proposal for a three-week summer program, residential activities, staffing support, and services for a residential program for the students of Beijing Normal University to be held from Saturday, July 20, through Saturday, August 10, 2019, at Tufts University. Working with the Confucius Institute, the International Programs and Partnerships department will partner with the Philosophy department to offer the following services:

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

The Philosophy department at Tufts University will offer to the students of Beijing Normal University a program entitled "American Philosophy and American Culture." This course is a philosophical examination of some influential writings, extending from the colonial period up to the present, which show the emergence in America of an increasingly secular and egalitarian view of the world built on public reason. With a particular focus on conceptions of justice, toleration, and liberty in American political life, the course begins with an exploration of founding American political documents before turning to more recent work by the American philosopher John Rawls. The course concludes with a range of responses to Rawls made in the spirit of the American philosophical tradition.

Objectives:

- To become acquainted with major themes in American religious, political, and philosophical culture through a close reading of primary texts and historical sources
- To attain familiarity with contemporary American philosophy and culture through lectures, multimedia presentations, and academic excursions
- To understand the intellectual history of American attention to the virtues of self-reliance, toleration, and pragmatism

- John Locke: Fundamental Constitution of the Carolinas, and Letter Concerning Toleration
- Thomas Paine, The Age of Reason (Part One)
- Declaration of Independence
- Letters between John Adams and Thomas Jefferson
- Notes on the State of Virginia (excerpt)
- The Federalist Papers (excerpts)

Week 2

- Asa Gray, Natural Selection not Inconsistent with Natural Theology
- Chauncey Wright, "Darwinism" and "Natural Theology as a Positive Science"
- Charles Darwin, Letter to Asa Gray
- John Dewey, Humanist Manifesto
- John Rawls, A Theory of Justice (Excerpts) from Ch. 4 & Ch. 5, and Political Liberalism (Excerpts)

Week 3

- Robert Nozick, Anarchy, State, and Utopia (Excerpts)
- Michael Sandel, TBD (Excerpts)

Tufts will assign a Lead Teacher and a co-instructor and multiple guest lecturers to conduct all classes.

The Academic Program will include:

- Classes that will take place Monday Friday 9:00 am 12:00 pm on the campus of Tufts University.
- A Lead Teacher who will develop the course material and an appropriate number of instructors to teach each class.
- An online platform that will be accessible prior to the students' arrival at Tufts University that will have important information related to the academic portion of the program.
- An academic orientation Monday, July 23, that will outline the academic requirements and expectations of the program.
