Social Pedagogy in Practice (I)

This course will focus on the significance of Social Pedagogy in Youth Work and Community Education. The latest trends in the practice of Youth Work in U.K. will be examined, with a particular focus on critical approaches, on the contributions of Freirean traditions. This course will also focus on the relationship between Community Education and Youth Work from the view points of Social Change.

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Imagining, Narrating and Representing the Future in the Precarious World

This seminar explores how the different notions of the future have been imagined, narrated, represented, questioned and contested by multiple actors, writers and scholars through examining literatures, documentaries and everyday practices in different societies, including contemporary Japan. In particular, this seminar focuses on two themes: 1) biological (non-) reproduction and the futurity and 2) human relations with machine/technology. Throughout the seminar, we will discuss following questions: 1) is future knowable and predictable? 2) Who has the privilege to imagine a linear futurity and eternal human progress? 3) How is the notion of future shaped by neoliberalism? 4) What are the implications of the representational practice that utilizes the figure of the Child to imagine a 'better' future? And finally 5) What would be future relations between human and technology?
